v) reject the application,

in line with the licensing objectives contained within the Licensing Act 2003.

#### 1. Executive summary

- 1.1 The purpose of the Licensing Sub-Committee meeting is to determine an application for a new Premises Licence at 30 Brook Street, Tavistock, PL19 OHE, to be known as 'Tap T'Inn' in accordance with Section 18 of the Licensing Act 2003.
- 1.2 The Licensing Authority received an application for a new Premises Licence for the above on 24<sup>th</sup> May 2018. The application is for the sale of alcohol for consumption on and off the premises, Monday to Sunday from 10:00 to 22:00; Christmas Eve from 10:00 to 00:00 and New Year's Eve from 10:00 to 00:30. A copy of the application and plan is attached at **Appendix A**.
- 1.3 Three representations in objection to the application were received during the consultation period from persons living in close proximity to the premises. Copies of the representations are attached at **Appendix B**. Mediation has not been possible and therefore it is necessary for the application to be determined by the licensing subcommittee.

#### 2. Background

- 2.1 The premises is currently closed, but has previously been used as a shop. The Applicant is aware that planning permission will also need to be granted, in addition to the premises licence, before being able to sell alcohol for consumption on the premises.
- 2.2 The premises is located in the town centre of Tavistock, in close proximity to a range of businesses and residential properties. Plans showing the location of the premises in relation to nearby properties can be found at **Appendix C** and photographs of the premises and vicinity are at **Appendix D**.
- 2.3 All three representations have been sent in by persons living in very close proximity to the premises and raise concerns relating to the 'Prevention of Public Nuisance' licensing objective. These include concerns that there will be disturbance and loss of privacy due to noise from customers. There is a specific concern about noise from persons leaving the premises after 22:00, and potentially taking alcohol with them to consume in the vicinity.
- 2.4 A concern raised in two of the representations in relation to 'Public Safety' is the access to and from the premises, leading to possible congestion on the pavement, with reference made to a recent road accident at this location between a car and a pedestrian. Also raised is the worry that children going to and from a nearby primary may have their safety compromised when passing the premises.
- 2.5 The full representations containing details of all the areas of concern can be found at **Appendix B**.

- 2.6 The Live Music Act 2012 and subsequent amendments, allow the provision of live and recorded amplified music at any premises licensed for the sale of alcohol for consumption on the premises between the hours of 08:00 and 23:00, or in this case, between 10:00 and 22:00 (hours licensed for sale of alcohol for consumption on the premises). There is no way to restrict these activities through the premises licence during these hours other than through the review process once a licence has been granted. Music played in the background (at a level where a conversation can be easily held) is never licensable. Should a licence be granted for the sale of alcohol for consumption on and off the premises, live and recorded amplified music will automatically be permitted between 10:00 and 22:00.
- 2.7 As relevant representations in respect of this application have been received, which have not been withdrawn and mediation has not been possible, the Licensing Sub-Committee acting on behalf of the Licensing Authority must make a determination on this application. When coming to a decision, the Licensing Sub-Committee must give consideration to the Council's Statement of Licensing Policy (the Policy) and Home Office guidance issued under Section 182 Licensing Act 2003 (revised April 2018).
- 2.8 Section 3.1 of the Policy states: The Licensing Authority has a duty under the Act to carry out its licensing functions with a view to promoting the four licensing objectives. (These objectives are the only matters to be taken into account in determining the application and any conditions attached must be appropriate to achieve the licensing objectives).
- 2.9 The four licensing objectives are:
  - The prevention of crime and disorder
  - Public safety
  - The prevention of public nuisance
  - The protection of children from harm
- 2.10 Section 3.2 of the Policy states: A licence (or club premises certificate) will only be granted where the Licensing Authority is satisfied that these objectives have been met.
- 2.11 Section 4.1 of the Policy sets out additional legislation, strategies, policies and guidance to which the Licensing Authority will have regard.
- 2.12 The Guidance issued under Section 182 of the Licensing Act 2003 which was revised and re-published in April 2018 state: The Licensing Authority may not impose conditions unless its discretion has been engaged following receipt of relevant representations and it is satisfied as a result of a hearing (unless all parties agree a hearing is not necessary) that it is appropriate to impose conditions to promote one or more of the four licensing objectives (paragraph 10.8 of the guidance).

- 2.13 The following responsible authorities are statutory consultees under the Licensing Act 2003:
  - Devon and Cornwall Police
  - Devon and Somerset Fire and Rescue Service
  - Devon Safeguarding Children's Board
  - Devon County Council Trading Standards
  - Devon Drug and Alcohol Action Team, NHS Devon
  - West Devon Borough Council Planning Department
  - Dartmoor National Park Authority Planning Department
  - West Devon Borough Council Environmental Health (Health & Safety)
  - West Devon Borough Council Environmental Health (Pollution Control)
  - Home Office Immigration Enforcement
- 2.14 There were no objections received from any of the responsible authorities.
- 2.15 In addition to the above responsible authorities, any person may make a representation in relation to a premises licence application.

#### 3. Outcomes/outputs

- 3.1 When determining an application for a premises licence, particularly when considering appropriate conditions and operating hours, the following sections of the Statement of Licensing Policy (the policy) and Section 182 Guidance (the guidance) are especially relevant:
- 3.2 Where applications have given rise to representations, any appropriate conditions should normally focus on the most sensitive periods. For example, the most sensitive period for people being disturbed by unreasonably loud music is at night and into the early morning when residents in adjacent properties may be attempting to go to sleep or are sleeping. This is why there is still a need for a licence for performances of live music between 11pm and 8am. In certain circumstances, conditions relating to noise immediately surrounding the premises may also prove appropriate to address any disturbance anticipated as customers enter and leave (paragraph 2.19 of the guidance).
- 3.3 Section 6.1 of the policy states: The Licensing Authority will deal with the issue of licensing hours on the individual merits of each application. When the Authority's discretion is engaged, consideration will be given to the individual merits of an application but the presumption will be to grant the hours requested unless there are objections to those hours raised by Responsible Authorities or other persons on the basis of the licensing objectives. However, when dealing with licensing hours beyond midnight it is more likely that relevant representations will be made unless there are higher standards of control within operating schedules to

- promote the licensing objectives, especially for premises which are situated near residential areas or in areas where anti-social disorder takes place.
- 3.4 Section 6.4 of the policy states: The terminal hours will normally be approved where the Applicant can show that the proposal would not adversely affect the licensing objectives unless, after hearing relevant representation the Licensing Authority believe it necessary, proportionate and reasonable to restrict the hours required. The Licensing Authority may set an earlier terminal hour where it considers this is appropriate to the nature of the activities and the amenity of the area.
- 3.5 Paragraph 10.14 of Guidance issued under Section 182 of the Licensing Act 2003 states: where there are objections to an application to extend the hours during which licensable activities are to be carried on and the licensing authority determines that this would undermine the licensing objectives, it may reject the application or grant it with appropriate conditions and/or different hours from those requested.
- 3.7 Section 10.1 of the Policy states: The Licensing Authority recognises the great variety of premises for which licences may be sought. These will include theatres, cinemas, restaurants, pubs, nightclubs, cafes, takeaways, community halls and schools. Access by children to all types of premises will not be limited unless it is considered necessary to do so in order to protect them from harm.
- 3.8 Section 10.2 of the Policy states: When deciding whether or not to limit access to children the Licensing Authority will judge each application on its own individual merits. Examples which may give rise to concern and warrant restrictions in the operating schedule include premises: -
  - □ where entertainment of an adult or sexual nature is provided
  - □ where there is a strong element of gambling taking place
  - with a known association with drug taking or dealing
  - where there have been convictions of the current management for serving alcohol to minors
  - with a reputation for allowing underage drinking
  - where the supply of alcohol for consumption on the premises is exclusive or primary purpose of the services provided at the premises.
- 3.9 The desired outcome is a determination of the application with reasons provided which relate to the four licensing objectives and when conditions are imposed, that these are appropriate to address the licensing objectives.

#### 4. Options available and consideration of risk

4.1 The Licensing Authority may decide to impose additional conditions to address the four licensing objectives, or to amend or remove

requested licensable activities. When coming to their decision the Licensing Sub-Committee must give consideration to the Section 182 Guidance and the Statement of Licensing Policy. Reasons must be given which relate to the licensing objectives for any decision made.

- 4.2 The Sub-Committee will need to consider the hours of operation proposed, the effectiveness of the operating schedule proposed by the applicant, the representations received, the location of the premises in relation to residential properties, the history of the management of the premises (if applicable), the evidence provided of any problems in the past, the likely impact of any extension of hours and activities, public transport, taxi availability, the right the applicant has to operate a business and balancing the rights of residents to the quiet enjoyment and privacy of family life. West Devon relies on tourism, with holidaymakers both from this country and international visitors who are, in the main, families with young children and retired people the very segment of society who would perhaps be deterred by anti-social behaviour. These, and any other relevant issues, may be explored at the hearing in so far as it reflects the four licensing objectives.
- 4.3 A decision made by the Licensing Sub-Committee may be appealed by the applicant or any person who has made relevant representations. The right of appeal is to the Magistrates' Court by virtue of Section 181 and Schedule 5 of the Licensing Act 2003. The Magistrates' Court may dismiss the appeal, or substitute its own decision, or send back the case to the Licensing Authority with directions as to how the case is to be dealt with. The Magistrates' Court may make any costs order it thinks fit.
- 4.4 The Licensing Act 2003 contains a provision which enables a responsible authority or any other person to apply to this Licensing Authority for a review of the premises licence once granted. A hearing follows which enables the Sub-Committee to use the normal powers available, but also to suspend the licence for a period of up to three months or to withdraw it.

#### 5. Proposed Way Forward

- 5.1 That the Sub-Committee consider the application for a new Premises Licence and make a determination in respect of this application, namely to:
  - i) grant the application as submitted, subject to any Mandatory Conditions required;
  - ii) modify the conditions of the licence;
  - iii) exclude any of the licensable activities to which the application relates;
  - iv) to refuse to specify a person in the licence as the premises supervisor:
  - v) reject the application,

in line with the licensing objectives (Section 4) contained within the Licensing Act 2003.

Y	The Licensing Act 2003 gives Licensing Authorities the responsibility for determining applications submitted under this provision. This is a statutory obligation.  As there have been relevant representations in respect of this application which have not been resolved, this hearing must be held. Relevant representations are about the likely effect of the grant of the application on the promotion of the licensing objectives, by responsible authorities or any other person. The Licensing Sub-Committee must disregard any information or evidence not relevant to the licensing objectives.  The Licensing Sub-Committee must consider this application in accordance with Section 4 of the Licensing Act 2003, which requires that licensing functions must be carried out with a view to promoting the four licensing objectives. The Licensing Authority must also have regard to its own licensing policy and the Secretary of State's guidance, but may depart from both if it has good reason to do so. Those reasons should be stated.  The Act requires (Section 18) that in dealing with a new premises licence application, the committee takes any of the following steps which are appropriate for the promotion of the licensing objectives:  (a) to grant the licence subject to:  i) the conditions mentioned in section 18 (2)(a) [ie as applied for] modified to such as extent as the authority considers necessary for the promotion of the licensing objectives, and ii) any conditions which must under section19, 20 or 21 be included in the licence;  (b) to exclude from the scope of the licence any of the licensable activities to which the application relates;  (c) to reject the application

		decision to take any of these steps. Similarly, if the application is rejected, the Sub-Committee must give its reasons.
		The applicant or any person who has made relevant representations has the right to appeal a decision made by the Licensing Sub-Committee to the Magistrates' Court by virtue of Section 181 and Schedule 5 of Licensing Act 2003.
		On appeal, the Magistrates' Court may:  a) dismiss the appeal;  b) substitute for the decision appeal against another decision which could have been made by the Licensing authority;  c) remit the case to the Licensing Authority to dispose of it in accordance with the direction of the court.

**M** Describe the steps you intend to take to promote the four licensing objectives:

#### a) General – all four licensing objectives (b, c, d and e) (please read guidance note 10)

The business will sell premium priced 'craft' alcohol for consumption on the premises and in the home. While such specialist businesses are relatively new in the UK, there is no evidence that these contribute negatively to the licensing objectives, particularly to crime and disorder in the form of public order, street or under-age drinking.

An Operating Schedule is in place providing the hours of operation and licensable activities during those hours. This includes:

- Designated premises supervisor in place.
- All staff will be trained in the requirements of the Licensing Act 2003 as soon as they are recruited, along with regular training and updating.
- All staff responsible for alcohol sales shall be suitably trained for their job function in the operating standards for the premises. The training shall be under constant review having regard to newly employed staff.
- All staff shall be suitably trained in the operating procedures for refusing service to any person who is drunk or is under-age or appears to be under-age.
- Training shall be recorded in documentary form that will be available for inspection at the request at all reasonable times by an authorised officer from a relevant responsible authority. The records will be retained for at least 12months.
- All staff shall be trained in the requirements of the Challenge 25 policy
- Challenge 25' policy in place.
- The business will be owner-managed by a personal licence holder who will also be the designated premises supervisor.

The owner of the business is highly experienced in business and multi-agency engagement, particularly to address crime and criminality. She will use this to maximise opportunities to promote the four licensing objectives in her business and across the town centre through the BID, and any other relevant partnership opportunities as they arise.

#### b) The prevention of crime and disorder

A clear notice giving the hours of opening during which licensable activities are permitted.

Customers will not be permitted to take open containers of alcoholic drinks from the premises.

Glasses will be removed from public areas as soon as they are finished with or empty.

An incident book will be kept to record the details of all instances of refused sales together with the description of the customer and reason for refusal must be recorded. The incident book must be made available to the Police and Weights and Measures (Trading Standards).

CCTV system will be installed and operative at all times while the premises are trading and the

equipment must be maintained to the satisfaction of the chief of police. Recorded images will be retained for 30 days and made available to Police Officer on request, at any reasonable time. If the CCTV equipment is inoperative the Police and Licensing Authority will be informed as soon as possible and immediate steps must be taken to put the equipment back into action.

No sale of alcohol to drunk or intoxicated customers.

No personal solicitation outside or in the vicinity of the premises.

Vigilance in illegal drug use throughout the premises.

Active member of local pub watch working closely with other licensees and the police to prevent the sale of alcohol to those already under the influence of alcohol and / or committing a public order offence.

Active member of Tavistock BID – identifying and supporting projects to prevent crime and disorder.

#### c) Public safety

The business owner is investing into public safety including fire safety and accessibility.

The electrical system, including portable appliances, will be inspected visually annually by a competent person to ensure safety.

All Safety Certificates and inspection reports will be kept on site and made available for inspection by officers of relevant statutory bodies.

When disabled people are present, adequate arrangements will exist to enable their safe evacuation in the event of an emergency.

There will be adequate arrangements for first aid provision. A first aid box with an adequate and appropriate supply of first aid equipment and materials must be available for the use of patrons. Suitable protective equipment will be provided to deal with hypodermic needles, blood spillages and other body fluids. Procedures must be in place to ensure that body fluids are dealt with in a safe manner to avoid the risk of communicable disease.

The premises will, following a fire safety audit and remedial works, comply with all statutory fire safety controls.

The premises will comply with all food safety regulations.

The premises will provide accessible facilities wherever it is reasonable to do so including low level counters, single level entrance, ensuring staff are accessibility aware and ready to read out information and carry products.

#### d) The prevention of public nuisance

#### Noise

All reasonable steps have been taken to prevent disruption to neighbours including the business owner investing heavily into soundproofing to each party wall shared with residents. Noise or vibration will not emanate from the premises such as to cause persons in the neighbourhood to be unreasonably disturbed.

Only background level recorded music will be played at any time and speakers will not be attached to walls shared with residential properties

Deliveries and waste management will only be undertaken by commercial contractors during agreed hours of operation within the town centre. The delivery of goods will be restricted to between 07:00 - 19:00.

The very small outside space will only be used for access to the toilet. Drinking, smoking or any other congregating will not be permitted in this area.

Suitable signage will be provided at relevant exits requesting patrons make as little noise as possible when leaving the premises and vicinity as quietly and quickly as possible.

#### Light

Will not be obtrusive to the residential properties above or adjacent.

#### Waste

Any rubbish stored outside and produced by the premises awaiting collection for disposal will be stored securely in a designated area or in a bin with a tight fitting/lockable lid, to prevent litter being blown around.

#### **Smells**

No noxious smells or smoke will be produced by the business because there will be no causes such as food preparation taking place.

The only waste will be glass and cardboard which will be removed via commercial contract as above.

#### Litter

Receipts are the only potential cause of litter and in line with other commercial outlets customers will be asked if they require one.

#### Car parking

Non on-site.

Provided on street and in the multi-storey opposite, both sited away from residential areas. Signage will be placed advising customers not to block the highway and of nearest car parking. and to respect the peace of local residents late at night.

#### **Residents associations**

The business owner will make themselves known to local residents and any associations in the vicinity and be willing to attend meetings.

#### e) The protection of children from harm

No tobacco / smoking products will be on sale in the premises.

No advertising involving those seemingly 25 or under will be used on or elsewhere to promote the business.

There will be a "Challenge 25" proof of age policy. Any person who appears to be under the age of 25 years will have to provide valid identification before they are permitted to purchase alcohol. The only forms of identification accepted are a valid UK Photo Driving Licence, Passport or recognised Pass Scheme ID.

There will be no gaming machines installed.

Online/telephone orders

Any telephone or internet sales payments will be made through a credit card or similar by persons over the age of 18. All deliveries will be made to a bona fide address.

Customers ordering online will be required to confirm that they are over 18 years of age.

All parcels sent out containing alcohol will be sent out by means of a 'signed delivery' and the person signing to accept delivery must be able to prove their age

All parcels will be labelled to advise that it contains alcohol and on delivery will not be left with anyone under the age of 18.

Delivery note and record of each delivery will be kept and a delivery refusal record will be kept.



# Re: <u>Tap T'inn, 30 Brook Street, Tavistock, PL19 0HE Application from Melinda</u> Brown

Dear Sir/Madam,

I am writing to object to the above application for a new premises licence application for the sale of alcohol for consumption on and off the premises. I have lived for over 30 years. I have a number of serious concerns as follows:

### Public Safety

Licensed premises on this site will compromise highway safety for school children, residents, shoppers and visitors to Tavistock. The pavement, which is extremely narrow on this part of Brook Street, gets extremely congested and, even now, people tend to walk on the road at Vigo Bridge to avoid jostling. Earlier this year, there was a road accident between a pedestrian and a car.

In addition, there is simply not the external space for safety of entrance and exit to licensed premises

#### Public Nuisance

This end of Tavistock is the start of one of the town's popular residential areas. A further license in this area (less than 50 metres from the Tavistock Inn) will have an extremely adverse effect on the residential amenity of many households in the area particularly those in Vigo Bridge, Parkwood Road and Dancy Mews etc. with increased noise, general disturbance and loss of privacy, during and after the long opening hours.

Furthermore, the proposed development of these premises will undermine the character and appearance of the other listed buildings and will ultimately undermine the charm and character of Tavistock as a whole. The proposal to turn this small attractive shop into licensed premises would be out of character with this historic corner of Brook Street.

## · Protection of Children.

Vigo Bridge is a main access to St Rumons School for children which has upwards of 150 pupils of seven years and younger, mums with push chairs, and others. Safety issues in this area are already an issue and access for young school children should not be compromised further.

Finding the correct business to inhabit this historic Grade 11 listed property which is an important building in Tavistock is very important but a beer bar I am sure is not the answer.






There we no licence extensions, north outside space and no alcohol sold at closing time to take out, I'd have no objections - in fact I'd wish them well.
